The World Dignity University (WDU) fosters education on a wide range of Human Dignity related matters and on Humiliation, being the violation of Human Dignity.

The WDU is envisaged as a university in the original sense of the word: A community of scholars emphasizing education. It is not an accredited institution controlled by any government or corporation. Background

A World Dignity University must respect and draw from wisdom globally. Our vision is all about connecting across cultures, disciplines, and institutions, serving the important goal of creating "unity in diversity." Technology allows us to easily build cyber-bridges across cultures, disciplines, and institutions, opening the door to new possibilities and innovative ideas.

As a learning community, HumanDHS efforts have revealed that equal dignity is not something one gives to others; it is a way of being in relationships. Thus, it needs to be cultivated through thoughtful actions that consistently communicate mutual respect and build mutual understanding. Moreover, equal dignity will not be achieved through individual change; it will be achieved through changing relationships – relationships at all levels, e.g., interpersonal, social, and international – and this changes everything we do to promote dignity!

Ultimately, we envision the WDU as a model of global academic collaboration with "equality in dignity" at the core of its curriculum! Unlike any other network, it will provide a platform for a world community of scholars united in their efforts to realize equal dignity through a global approach to excellence in scholarship. Most of all, it will offer an innovative and urgently needed new pathway to peace based on cocreated learning that dignifies the lives of all people. The WDU is intended as an ongoing, everevolving collaborative project. We are currently in the start-up phase, elaborating the concept and inviting proposals for courses.

In June 2011, the initiative was presented to the public. A workshop with about 30 participants in Oslo plus additional online attendees was held with support from the University of Oslo.

Erik Solheim, Norway's Minister of the Environment and International Development greeted the participants via a pre-recorded video message.

Another warm message of support was given by Federico Mayor Zaragoza, former Secretary General of UNESCO, also via video.

Currently (as of fall 2011) the founding team collects proposals from members of the Human Dignity and Humiliation Studies network, as well as from other scholars.

Apart from planning a curriculum and courses, the operational aspects of the World Dignity University are discussed and co-operations with further higher education institutions are envisaged.

As the WDU is globally distributed and operates without a fixed location, it relies heavily on the Internet for communication. The WDU website and a Moodle-based online learning system are currently being set up.
