Welcome to Our "Workshop-within-a-Workshop": Non-Degree Higher and Adult Education to Advance Human Dignity

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In considering the potential roles of the World Dignity University initiative (WDUi), Evelin Lindner and others have invoked the original origins and meanings of the term "university," harkening back to a time before institutions of higher learning were organized around departments, credits, and degrees. These examples trace back to ancient times, when prominent philosophers would create their own schools and develop followings of eager students.

Now, of course, we have multiplicities of both highly structured universities built mainly around degree programs and an array of non-credit, higher and adult education offerings in a variety of settings and formats. Our workshop-within-a-workshop will examine the latter types of learning opportunities. Our focus will be on how we can foster non-credit, lifelong learning experiences that enhance human dignity. We will do so by asking what people wish to learn and teach, the settings and formats are available for such learning, and how we can access and create these opportunities.

This workshop-within-a-workshop captures one of our core objectives for WDUi: We invite members of the Human Dignity and Humiliation Studies community to find ways to advance human dignity through lifelong learning by:

- (1) Creating independent learning experiences through self-designed educational programs;
- (2) Discovering formal continuing education opportunities;
- (3) Creating and hosting discussion groups on topics of shared interest; and/or,
- (4) Developing and offering continuing education courses, seminars, and workshops.

To facilitate these opportunities with limited resources, we are fostering a philosophy and practice of self-guided learning and DIY program development. With these objectives as a frame, this workshop session will take the following approach, which emphasizes exploration and participation:

Workshop-within-a-Workshop Agenda

Part I – Introduction (15 minutes): Discuss how members of the HumanDHS community can plan, partake in, and create non-degree learning activities to advance human dignity, and explain WDUi's role in supporting members of our community who wish to create learning activities for others (15 minutes).

Part II – Guided Web-Surfing, i.e. (30 minutes): Invite workshop participants to do some guided web-surfing, by exploring schools and programs that might provide examples and inspiration for participating in or creating such offerings, *using the "Resources" links below and sites of their choosing.*

Part III – Breakthrough small group discussions (45 minutes): Participants will share and discuss their new discoveries and ideas, with each participant invited to discuss a dignity-enhancing learning activity that they would like to participate in or create (45 minutes)

Part IV – Reconvene, summarize, and look ahead (15 minutes): Wrapping up and looking towards future discussions and exchanges
